



Fredericksburg District FY 2020-2025 SYIP Highlights

Draft 2020-2025 Six Year Improvement Program (SYIP) highlights for the Fredericksburg District

DRPT's SYIP recommends \$879.3 million in statewide allocations for FY 2020. In the Fredericksburg District, this includes \$1.4 million in state and \$3.9 million in federal funds for transit and \$82.1 million in state and \$42.4 million in federal funds for rail.

Amtrak

Amtrak is DRPT's statewide operator for intercity passenger rail. DRPT funds annual capital and operating expenses for four intercity passenger routes with a total of six daily round trips originating in Newport News, Norfolk, Richmond, and Roanoke. All state-supported intercity passenger rail services the Northeast Corridor, offering a one-seat ride to additional destinations like Philadelphia, New York, and Boston.



Long Bridge & I-95 Corridor Improvements

DRPT's SYIP recommends nearly \$129 million in FY 2020 in state, federal, local, and private funds towards construction of the Long Bridge & I-95 Corridor Improvement projects.

The Long Bridge is a two track rail bridge over the Potomac River between Arlington and Washington, D.C., owned and operated by CSX. The bridge is currently at 98 percent capacity during peak hours with all freight, Amtrak, and Virginia Railway Express commuter rail traffic between Virginia and the northeast crossing in each direction. Seventy-six trains cross Long Bridge daily (34 VRE, 24 Amtrak, and 18 CSX) with an anticipated increase to 192 total daily trains by 2040.

Currently, District of Columbia Department of Transportation is completing its NEPA study of Long Bridge, with a Draft EIS expected in mid to late 2019 and a record of decision in mid-2020. Estimated costs of a new two track bridge upstream are anticipated to be \$1.3 to \$1.6 billion dollars. In conjunction with the Long Bridge project, DRPT recommends allocations of rail funds for five projects in Northern Virginia.

- Long Bridge Phase 1: 4th track in Arlington and Alexandria
- Alexandria VRE Station: Provide ADA compliant pedestrian tunnel and elevator access as well as improve platforms to accommodate two trains simultaneously
- Crystal City VRE Station: Relocate station and construct island platform to serve two trains simultaneously
- L'Enfant VRE Station & 4th Track: Construct 4th track and island platform allowing the station to serve two trains simultaneously
- 3rd Track between Franconia and Occoquan

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
